A message from the OTF President

Dear colleagues,

As we settle into another exciting school year, I want to extend a warm and heartfelt welcome back to each of you and to acknowledge the monumental effort you put into your work each and every day. The start of a new academic year always brings with it a sense of renewal, opportunity, and anticipation, and this year is no exception. Take a moment to acknowledge not just the monumental effort you put into your work, but also the broader issues at play that have significantly impacted our education system. Unfortunately, it is also a reminder of the ongoing challenges that we face, particularly those exacerbated by the Ford government's underfunding and under-resourcing of the education system.

Since 2018, Ontario's education system has been strained under policies that have systematically undervalued and underfunded our publicly-funded schools. Teachers have witnessed firsthand the consequences of these decisions: larger class sizes, a lack of essential resources, an increase in violence in our schools, and an erosion of support services that are vital for students' well-being and success. These issues are not just abstract concerns; they impact daily classroom dynamics and the quality of education our students receive.

The Ford government's approach to education funding has been marked by a troubling pattern of cutbacks and diminishing investment. Despite the growing needs of our schools, we have seen a consistent trend of underfunding, with resources stretched thinner each year. This has led to overcrowded classrooms where individual attention is harder to provide, eroding the quality of education and the support teachers can reasonably offer. Additionally, special education programs and mental health services—crucial for many students—have been particularly hard hit, leaving gaps that teachers (who are not trained clinicians or service providers) are inappropriately expected to fill.

Beyond the financial implications, the lack of respect for teachers and the teaching profession under this administration has been deeply concerning. The rhetoric coming from the government often seems disconnected from the reality of what it means to teach in today's Ontario. Teachers are professionals who dedicate their lives to nurturing the minds and hearts of students yet the government's policies and publicly-pronounced platitudes have often failed to acknowledge the expertise and commitment that teachers and educators bring to their roles or even to acknowledge them at all.

Despite these challenges, you continue to show remarkable dedication. You create engaging lessons, provide emotional support, and strive to make a positive difference in each student's life. Your commitment in the face of adversity speaks volumes about your professionalism and passion for teaching. That said, it is crucial to recognize that while individual efforts are praise-worthy, systemic issues require systemic solutions. The education system needs support and investment from those in power. That is why OTF will continue to advocate for policies that reflect the true value of education and to hold the government accountable.

As you teach in your classrooms, know that your voice is vital. Continue to speak out about the challenges you face and the needs of your students. Engage with your communities and make it clear that public education is a priority that must be supported by adequate levels of funding.

In closing, I want to express my deepest gratitude for your ongoing dedication to education and your unwavering commitment to your students. Your passion and hard work are the driving force behind the success of our schools and the bright futures of the young people we serve. Let's continue to strive for the changes our schools and students so richly deserve.

Keeping your head above water and finding your "flow"

When I was in my mid-teens, I had a near-drowning experience swimming in white water on Vancouver Island. Fortunately, I was a strong swimmer and had a buddy nearby to call on for life-saving help. A few months after that incident, I enrolled in a whitewater kayaking course, and in so doing committed myself to the aquatic equivalent of "getting back on the horse." In time, alongside instructors, then peers, I ended up in some BIG water—one whitewater class/category below "waterfall"—doing end-overs, surfing river waves, and effecting gajag rolls mid-stream after capsizing.

As this 2024–2025 school year got underway, I found myself reflecting on that experience from decades ago. These reflections occurred when I was kayaking on flat (lake) water this summer, again as I found myself watching (and listening to) the sound of flowing water...in our backyard's fountains, at local waterfalls and meandering streams and raging rivers, and lastly watching both the film Nyad (2023) and the documentary The River Runner (2021).


As teachers, we use the summer months (or parts thereof) to rest and recharge between school years. When school resumes each September, it can feel like being thrust out of a languid tidal pool or calm eddy into rolling surf or a strong current. It's shocking until we find our sea legs and reacclimatize to, yes, the flow and rhythm of the school day.

To be sure, teaching is not getting less complicated year over year. Just ask seasoned, veteran teachers. Post-pandemic ripples and constantly changing currents make navigating our professional duties tricky and tiring. Psychologist Mihaly Csikszentmihalyi, sometimes called the father of flow, observed that "the best moments in our lives are not the passive, receptive, relaxing times...[but those that] occur if a person's

body or mind is stretched to its limits in a voluntary effort to accomplish something difficult and worthwhile." Sounds like teaching, perhaps?

Sometimes we find our flow while going WITH the flow and other times by battling AGAINST it. And those instances aren't necessarily mutually exclusive. Like life in general, classroom and school life can fluctuate near-instantly between an innertube trip down a lazy river and a whitewater rafting expedition in a raging torrent. Too often, as teachers, we don't have the luxury of agency over all aspects of the flow of teaching and learning. What we do have, however, is our friends, family and colleagues who can celebrate our triumphs (big or small) and help us cope with and overcome our most vexatious challenges (big or small). With that in mind, my earnest hope for each of you, my colleagues, is that as you lean into your work, that you will find your own state of flow—whatever that looks like—this school year. Safe (and happy) paddling!

Our Ici on parle français PD grant program

The application deadline for 2024-25 is 5:00 p.m. on Thursday, October 10, 2024

lci on parle français was first launched as a pilot project in 2020–21. The original intention of the program was to provide small grants to individual FSL teachers across the province to support a variety of professional learning activities. The program is funded through the French as a Second Language Labour Market Partnership (FSL-LMP), led by the Ontario Public School Boards' Association (OPSBA).

In 2021–22, the program was expanded into a larger professional learning opportunity, inviting involvement both by individual FSL teachers and by those working in collaborative learning teams of two to four members. Funds can be used to participate in a professional learning activity or program or to purchase teacher/ educator resources to support teachers' FSL proficiency and pedagogy. For those working in a team, the maximum grant is \$500 per team member (maximum of \$2,000 per team) and for those working individually, the maximum grant is \$250.

The application deadline for 2024–25 is 5:00 p.m. on Thursday, October 10, 2024

Jessica Duncan, Beginning Teacher Morse Street Junior Public School, Toronto



Bill 124 and new collective agreements: Retroactive salary increases and your pension

The OTF Special Recognition Award, established in 2020, is presented annually to an organization, group or individual in acknowledgement of outstanding contributions to publicly funded education in Ontario, beyond the school board level.

The 2024 recipient of the award is The Period Purse.

The Period Purse, founded in 2017 by teacher Jana Girdauskas, strives to create menstrual equity by ensuring sustainable access to period products for all, and by ending the stigma associated with periods through education and advocacy. The Period Purse always encourages people of all genders and backgrounds to take part in its education sessions, in order to open up the conversation about periods to everyone—not just menstruators. The Period Purse works hard to continue developing their education program for diverse communities. Today, The Period Purse is the first (and only) Canadian registered charity to deal with menstrual equity.

The Period Purse also offers five period-positive education sessions for free, in both English and French. They are geared towards students in Grades 5-12, post-secondary and adults of all genders and delivered virtually and in-person (where available) by trained facilitators. They also offer a presentation, geared toward Grade 9 students through adulthood, that was created by, and for, First Nation, Métis, Inuit groups/organizations.

The Period Purse's efforts not only complement the Ontario Health curriculum by addressing crucial aspects of menstrual health but also go beyond, encouraging students to become leaders and advocates for change in their communities. Through their innovative programs and inclusive approach, they empower students to champion menstrual equity and contribute to creating a more inclusive and equitable society for all.
